



de are thrilled to introduce you to the newest member of the YRMC Foundation team, Kate Hanni. Kate and her husband, Tim, moved to Prescott from Bend, Oregon approximately four years ago to be close to Kate's aging parents. It proved to be a fortuitous move. Shortly after their relocation, suspicion of COVID-19 infection found Kate in Yavapai Regional's Emergency Department. The COVID test proved negative; however, quite unexpectedly, a CT scan found

Kate had pneumonia in her right lung and a nearly undetectable mass in her left breast. A biopsy soon confirmed the mass to be an aggressive form of breast cancer. Today, three and a half years later, Kate is cancer-free. And she gratefully and enthusiastically shares with all that it was our Medical Center and the Baskin Breast Care Center that saved her life.

How Kate came to be a member of our Foundation team is another story of happenstance and our mutual good fortune. But suffice to say we are delighted that Kate now brings her many talents and extensive fundraising experience with the National Alopecia Areata Foundation and Cascade School of Music to benefit our Medical Center and the health and wellbeing of our community.

As mentioned in our inside front cover feature, Larry was a U.S. Army veteran, Federal Reserve employee and 13-year Yavapai Regional volunteer. A close family member said of Larry that he believed in the Golden Rule, the power of positive thinking and prayer, keeping on the sunny side of life, and putting a smile on someone's face every day. Larry loved the small-town feel of our community and

held a wide variety of interests including staying fit through outdoor activities, reading, music, and learning new languages and cooking techniques.

The purpose of the Cunningham Center for Compassionate Aging is to help others continue to live productive and fulfilling lives. The Center's interior, painted to reflect Arizona's desert landscape. includes seven patient exam rooms, screening areas, private conference rooms, and a welcoming front lobby featuring a tribute display to Larry. A team of medical professionals including two physicians, a doctorate-degree nurse practitioner, pharmacist, licensed social worker, and clinical care navigator is committed to helping patients and their families navigate the heart-wrenching anguish that comes when loved ones no longer resemble who they once were even as they lose their ability to remember and recognize those closest to them.

At the naming ceremony, we had the pleasure of hosting a visit by members of the Cunningham family including Larry's first cousin, Meredith "Mimi" Johnson, her husband, John, and her son, Andy. Yavapai Regional President and CEO Dr. Anthony Torres underscored the impact the Cunningham gift will have on the cognitive health of our community, from prevention to diagnosis and treatment as well as for supporting those patients and their family members and friends serving as care partners. Dr. Sam Downing, Director of Geriatric and Palliative Medicine, also expressed his gratitude for a life and legacy so well lived. We are so grateful to Larry and his family for his generosity in providing for the wellbeing of others.

Trident HD Specimen Radiography System

When our Baskin Breast Care Center patients are facing stereotactic breast biopsies or breast surgeries, it is critical when removing and analyzing breast tissue to ensure all malignant tissue has been captured, that the margins are clear, and that targeted calcifications are visible.

Thanks to the generosity of donors to our Breast Care Fund, the YRMC Foundation was able to assist the Baskin Breast Care Center with the purchase of a Hologic Trident HD Specimen Radiography System for this purpose.

This state-of-the-art system generates sharp, highly detailed images for rapid sample verification by our clinical staff right in the procedure room, eliminating the need to transport the specimen for imaging, offering immediate margin confirmation with no delays, and reducing recall procedures which can lead to anxiety. We are grateful for this opportunity to continue to improve the patient experience and provide peace of mind.

Partners for Healthy Students Mobile Clinic

Our new Partners for Healthy Students mobile clinic was launched with open house events held at our Prescott and Prescott Valley campuses. The program brings health care services to eligible uninsured and underinsured children and their siblings in participating area schools.

Funding for the new clinic was provided entirely through the generosity of the YRMC Foundation's donor community.



We are also most grateful to Dr. Pierre Tibi, who donated the proceeds from several years' Crawfest events to our Partners for Healthy Students fund for this purchase.

Improvements available in the new mobile clinic include:

- An inverter which eliminates the need to run a generator while driving to power the higher efficiency refrigerator/ freezer containing vaccination doses
- Improved storage throughout the unit for medical supplies, increased counter space, and a built-in patient exam table with additional storage
- An eye wash station located in the restroom rather than in the main area, providing a more comfortable and roomy waiting space for families
- Improved router and WiFi to ensure prompt and efficient connectivity with other hospital resources
- Sturdier steps with a built-in handrail for added entry/exit safety

Additional good news is that the previous mobile clinic, which had been in use for 10 years, has been donated by Yavapai Regional to our local Lions Clubs, where

it will be retrofitted and used in the community as a vision screening clinic.

We are thankful to our donors to the Partners for Healthy Students Fund for enabling us to continue providing the highest quality health care for the most vulnerable members of our community.

Baskin Breast Care Center Cooking Demonstration

More than 50 breast cancer patients, their families and care partners, donors, and Medical Center volunteers attended a cooking demonstration designed to share healthy nutrition choices for breast cancer patients. Inspired by the personal journey of YRMC Foundation staff member Kate Hanni (see page 7), this special event featured professional chef and accredited wine expert Tim Hanni, Kate's husband of 30 years.

The event was lively and engaging.

A comment heard was that it was an evening of Humankindness in action.

Since the event, the YRMC Foundation has received numerous requests that it continue to sponsor an ongoing series of demonstrations. We are pleased that donations to the Breast Care Fund help support such educational opportunities for patients both experiencing breast cancer and survivors alike.

Spinning ... What?

We'd like to introduce you to Spinning Babies®, a physiological education approach to preparing for and caring for birth designed by midwife Gail Tully. During birth, babies descend through the pelvis by turning to fit each curve in the passage, a process called "fetal rotation." If fetal rotation can be made easier, birth becomes easier for everyone involved.

Thanks to donor gifts
to the Family Birthing
Center Fund, including
through our 2023 Crawfest
event, the YRMC Foundation
was able to support attendance
of the Spinning Babies course by
24 members of our Yavapai Regional
staff who work with moms prior to and
after delivery. Areas represented included
our Family Birthing Center (FBC) labor/
delivery, inpatient/outpatient, midwives,
physical therapy and the FBC family/
childbirth nurse educator.

Instruction topics included the importance of tracking mothers during pregnancy to identify positioning issues, avoiding C-sections and other interventions needed to perform birth, cardinal movements (engagement, descent, flexion, internal rotation, extension, external rotation and expulsion) within the birth canal, and pelvic positioning and other innovative positioning methods.

Planned next steps include enrolling the group in a follow-up advanced training,

followed by occasional refresher sessions over the next two years. Our staff was very grateful to be able to attend this program, expressing the session gave them greater confidence

and helped them gain innovative ideas to incorporate into the FBC's current educational program. We appreciate your support.


